Under the radar: risk management in small charities

About the survey


The survey's purpose is to establish attitudes and ability to manage operational and compliance risks among grassroots charities and not-for-profits. Also, where they go for help and training.

330 valid responses from organisations across the UK with an annual income of less than \pounds 500,000 were received and analysed.

This is a joint project between the University of Suffolk's Institute for Social and Economic Research and independent digital insurance broker PolicyBee.

The aim is to help small charities and not-for-profits recognise and reduce their risk profile against a background of dwindling funding and resources, and increased scrutiny. The further intention is to point them towards useful sources of help and support, so they can more easily focus on pursuing their charitable objectives.

Note: PolicyBee has created an online *Help Hub*, where charities and not-for-profits can find useful resources for managing their organisation and their risks better.



Key takeaways

Organisations are most worried about money. The biggest external risk is identified as loss of funding (70%) and the biggest internal risk as reduced income or revenue streams (74%).



Other major risks involve people. Organisations view recruitment of trustees and volunteers (62%) as the next most significant external risk, and risks linked to staff and volunteers (44%) as next in line for internal risks.



One in ten 'doesn't have' or 'isn't sure' if they have any risk management measures in place at all. Of those that do, there is an average of only one risk management measure per organisation, and no more than three per organisation among all respondents. Only a small number (8%) have a risk register.



Respondents doubt their organisation's ability to assess and manage risk. Almost half (47%) are only 'somewhat confident' or less so in their capacity to identify and assess risk. And more than half (54%) feel only 'somewhat confident' or less so when it comes to their ability to manage risk.



Lack of time (64%), lack of funds (52%) and lack of expertise (39%) are identified as the main reasons why risk management practices aren't implemented.



Relevant training is in short supply, with nearly two-thirds (62%) having received no risk management or governance training – most commonly due to lack of funds (57%), lack of time (50%), and not knowing where to go for training (45%).



When it comes to seeking advice on risk management and governance issues, most rely on their board of trustees to provide the expertise (55%), or their peers and colleagues (46%).



There isn't widespread take-up of the support and advice on offer from some of the sector's main regulatory bodies and umbrella organisations. Two thirds (66%) say they aren't familiar with the organisations listed.



Information provided by local voluntary support organisations such as community foundations and *CVSs is identified as the most reliable (59% 'satisfied' or 'very satisfied') – although nearly a third (30%) say they 'never' use them.



The larger the organisation, the more likely they are to be 'very familiar' with the major regulatory bodies and umbrella organisations, especially in the annual income over £100,000 bracket $(43\%)^{**}$.

External & internal risks

What we learned

Risk to funding is the outright biggest worry for organisations, whether that be external funding e.g. grants (70%) or internal funding e.g. their capacity to generate income streams (74%). This comes on the back of an ongoing squeeze on central government funding to local councils since 2010.

The ability to recruit trustees and staff is seen as the next largest external risk for organisations (62%), while managing the risks associated with them comes next on the list of internal concerns (44%).


Data handling and GDPR is a concern for 28% and cyber risks worry 25%.

Respondents were asked to free type any additional external and internal risks that also worry them. This generated three new causes for concern, although numbers for each are small: regulatory compliance (2%) and loss of members (2%) as external risks, and child safety protection (1%) as an internal risk.



Which of these external risks are you concerned about in the next 12 months?



Spotting and managing risk


What we learned

A considerable chunk, 47% of respondents, feel their organisation is only 'somewhat confident' or at a level below that in identifying risk, while 54% feel the same about their capability to manage risk. That suggests a real concern among respondents about their organisation's ability to spot and head off risks before they turn into problems.



How would you rate your organisation's confidence to identify and assess risk?



Risk management strategies & obstacles

What we learned

Respondents were asked to free type their organisation's risk management measures, rather than choose from a list. Individual responses were then allocated to one of seven wider risk management categories and information was extracted to establish numbers of risk management measures in place per organisation.

The largest group (42%) say they have 'Assessment, evaluation, monitoring' measures in place, whereas for the other eight risk measurement categories, numbers fall below a quarter for all but 'risk management policies & procedures'. Only 8% say their organisation has a risk register.

The maximum number of risk management measures in place for any organisation is three, and the average is one. One in ten 'doesn't have' or 'aren't sure' if they have any risk management measures in place at all.

The major barrier to organisations putting risk management measures in place is reported as lack of time (64%), followed by lack of funds (52%) and lack of

expertise (39%). This paints a picture of hard-pressed charity managers short on the time they need to properly audit their risks or do anything about them – compounded by a lack of funds for appropriate training and a lack of expert knowledge and readily available information.

And while statutory risk management is a necessity only for larger charities with annual income above £1 million in England and Wales, or above £500,000 in Scotland and Northern Ireland (plus charities with incomes above £250,000 and assets worth more than £3.26 million for the whole UK), The Charity Commission strongly emphasises the need for small charities also to monitor risk:

"Trustees of smaller charities with gross income below the statutory audit threshold (who should still be concerned about the risks their charity faces) are encouraged to make a risk management statement as a matter of good practice."

Risk management and governance training

What we learned

Nearly two-thirds of respondents (62%) have had no risk management or governance training. Those who have report an overwhelmingly positive outcome (89%) and a wide variety of sources for their training – the most common being current or previous employers (23%), local community & voluntary organisations (22%) and local government (14%) (see appendix 1).


Lack of funds (57%) comes top of the reasons why respondents are unable to access training, followed by lack of time (50%) – again suggesting charity and community workers lack both the cash and the spare hours required to improve their risk management and governance skills.

A significant proportion (45%) also report that they wouldn't know where to look for training, implying a lack of clear signposting for the sector.

Have you ever received risk management/governance training?



Did the training improve your organisation's knowledge and ability to deal with risk?



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Seeking advice on risk management & governance

People mostly rely on the people around them when seeking advice on risk management and governance. 55% look to their board of trustees to supply the expertise - whereas many small charities won't have that luxury.

Peers and colleagues (46%) are the second most popular source of advice and information. But this again raises questions for those working alone, in isolation or solely with volunteers.

Meanwhile, large numbers (66%) say they are unfamiliar with several of the key regulatory and umbrella bodies within the sector – which in themselves are important providers of information.

21% say they are not familiar with The Charity Commission, with numbers rising to 59% for the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO - the regulator for data protection and GDPR) and 49% for the Fundraising Regulator.


45% report a lack of familiarity with their local networks, including community foundations and CVSs*. Yet the advice and information provided by local voluntary and membership organisations tops the table for reliability, with a 59% satisfaction rate.

The most widely consulted resource for information and advice is the gov.uk website, with 60% of respondents reporting using it in the past 12 months. Just over half say they made use of their local networks in that timeframe, but nearly a third report 'never' using them.

32% also say they 'never' make use of The Charity Commission, and less than a third had consulted the ICO in the year GDPR came into force. Only 8% had used the Fundraising Regulator.


From where is information on dealing with risk mostly sought?

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How satisfied were you with the advice and information you received from:





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
Which of these regulatory bodies and umbrella organisations are you 'not so familiar' or 'not at all familiar' with?

Q How familiar are you with the main regulatory bodies and umbrella organisations?



Who took part and how?

The University of Suffolk is home to the Suffolk Institute for Social and Economic Research (SISER).

PolicyBee was established in 2010 as an independent digital insurance broker.

The survey is a collaboration between PolicyBee, an independent insurance broker, and the University of Suffolk. The University's lead on the project is Dr Olumide Adisa, principal investigator within its Suffolk Institute for Social and Economic Research. Dr Adisa provided the statistical analysis.


The survey was available on Survey Monkey from 2 July to 9 September 2018. A link to it was distributed widely both by PolicyBee and The University of Suffolk, and also shared by various other charity organisations among their memberships. A £200 incentive was offered in the shape of a prize draw, with a cheque paid to the randomly-chosen winning charity.

394 people across the UK took part in the survey. However, 64 (16%) were above the income cut-off level of \pounds 500,000 and were disqualified from the outset. That left 330 valid responses, although not all respondents answered all questions.

About our respondents

Of the 330 valid responses to the survey, there is good representation from across the country, and from organisations working in many different areas across the sector.


The largest number of responses are from the East of England (38%). This was as expected, as both PolicyBee and the University of Suffolk are Ipswich-based, while Community Action Suffolk was very active in sharing the survey.



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Where is your organisation based?



Where does your organisation operate?



(638 responses - respondents could tick as many as applied.)



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
